Lories and lorikeets are small to medium-sized parrots characterized by their specialized brush-tipped tongues for feeding on nectar and soft fruits. The birds are in the parrot family, Psittacidae. Widely distributed throughout the Australasian region, including south-eastern Asia, Polynesia, Papua New Guinea and Australia, the majority have very brightly colored plumage. The natural diet for lorikeets includes flowers and nectar.

Lorikeets! is open daily at 10:00 a.m. through October 2nd.

The exhibit closes 30 minutes prior to Zoo closing. Admission to the exhibit is free with paid Zoo admission. Lorikeet nectar is available for \$1.00. Join our "Team Lorikeet" Volunteers

A Blend of Education, Conservation and Fun

Education and conservation are at the heart of the mission of every professional zoological institution ... and **your Zoo** is no exception. Among Micke Grove Zoo's education successes is the popular **ZooFari Zoo Camp** program that continues to attract hundreds of new participants each year.

With great interactive experiences, wildlife-oriented arts and crafts, play and informal learning, Zoo Camp is a great way to nurture science literacy ... and to launch the conservation heroes of tomorrow. There are many activities and changes for 2011 – some completed and some underway. But one thing is certain ... all are exciting! Visit the Zoo this season for a great day of exploration and learn more about the amazing diversity of the animal kingdom. Your old friends - and a few new ones - will be here to greet you!



The Zoo brought in another highly endangered golden-lion tamarin – a female from The Hogle Zoo in Salt Lake City. This species' survival in its lowland Atlantic tropical forest habitat has been in jeopardy. The golden lion tamarin is the object of an exciting effort to reintroduce the species to protected areas of eastern Brazil's coastal forest. As part of a population management program of the Association of Zoo's and Aquarium's known as the Species Survival Plan, this new female is partnered with a male from our family group of golden-lion tamarins. The hope is that this genetically valuable pair will produce offspring. Initially housed in off-display quarters, the pair will be exhibited in an area currently under renovation.

In April, a young female golden eagle was brought to us from Lindsay Wildlife Museum in Walnut Creek, California. The eagle sustained an injury in the wild that prevents her from being released. Golden eagles are native to nearly all parts of North America, particularly the West. These majestic birds are second in size only to the California condor among North America's birds of prey. Golden eagles, though mostly brown, get their name from the golden coloration at the back of the crown and nape. Keep an eye out for this magnificent raptor when you visit the Zoo.





Many are familiar with Micke Grove Zoo's radiated tortoise exhibit, a component of the "Island Lost in Time" complex. "Island Lost in Time" refers to the island of Madagascar, separated from the Eastern coast of Africa some 160 million years ago. Many Madagascan animals, including the Zoo's radiated tortoises, are found nowhere else in the world.

Another animal unique to Madagascar and nearby islands is the lesser vasa, or black parrot. Five of these curious birds were acquired from the National Aviary in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania to join the radiated tortoises as part of a mixed-species exhibit. With their somber plumage, black parrots are distinctive among parrots and will be an interesting and welcome addition to the collection. Animal care staff has made changes to the terrariums at the "Island Lost in Time" to enable better viewing of several tiny mantella frogs, also Madagascar natives.





Zoo staff is closely monitoring our female southern pudu, anticipating a birth this season. Among the smallest of deer species, the southern pudu is native to Chile.

A female northern pintail duck has been brought in to pair with a male exhibited in "Tule Islands", the native waterfowl exhibit.

DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

Despite the challenges of sustaining County facilities and services during a period of declining tax revenues, Micke Grove Zoo continues to offer a great family recreational and educational experience. As San Joaquin County officials wrestle with budget challenges, the need for non-County support of the Zoo and its programs has never been more apparent. Given the many demands for County services, simply sustaining current operations requires far more resources than local government alone is able to provide. To make necessary exhibit changes that meet animal needs, to provide zoo facilities and services that meet public expectations, and to pursue the Zoo's wildlife conservation objectives requires hard work, creativity, cooperation ... and funding.

Fortunately, we have areas of opportunity to augment our limited tax-dollars. These include **earned revenues** such as admission, program and membership fees, and **donations** such as memorial gifts and event sponsorships. **Public and private grants** for specific projects are among potential funding sources. Both public and private revenues are essential for virtually every successful zoo. At Micke Grove, all funding mechanisms need to be explored and developed to realize the Zoo's potential as an outstanding, popular regional resource.

We have slowly begun the build-out of an exciting **MGZ Facilities Master Plan**. Bringing this plan to reality will require wise management of current funding sources and cultivation of new revenue streams – both public and private.

The Micke Grove Zoological Society was established to spearhead private support for San Joaquin County's Zoo. Through its membership, retail sales and fundraising, the Society is positioned to play a major role in the Zoo's future. **Your involvement** in Society programs and activities is one way to support Micke Grove Zoo. There is a role for everyone in building a strong, cooperative and effective public-private partnership ... a building project that remains a key element in advancing **your Zoo**.
